

## West Virginia Room at DAR Constitution Hall



West Virginia is fortunate to sponsor one of the State Period Rooms in Memorial Continental Hall. The room is set up like a school room in the parlor of a house in 1820 where parents or a tutor could help children learn. In keeping with DAR

Museum policy, the furnishings reflect American craftsmanship and decorative tastes prior to 1830. And while to our modern eyes the patterned carpet and the decorated wallpaper may seem busy and in conflict with each other, they are typical of pre-1830 tastes. Most of the furnishings were generously donated.



Among the furniture you will see in the room include a fold-top writing desk that belonged to Robert Rutherford, a Virginia delegate to Congress, a barrel organ, a Pembroke table, a needlework fire-screen, and an American piano. The piano was carried over the mountains by horse-drawn wagon and is said to be the most valuable item in the DAR Museum.



The room serves as a wonderful reminder of our country's heritage. Although many of our ancestors, especially on the frontier of western Virginia, could not afford the beautiful fittings of this room, we must keep their important contributions in mind. Because of their service and sacrifice they made it possible for more of us today to live the type of lifestyle that this room portrays.
